Stay tuned for an open house announcement! In the meantime, stop by and see our new space.



CW 150 Legacy Project

In 2006, the General Assembly created the Virginia Sesquicentennial of the American Civil War Commission to plan, develop, and carry out programs and activities to commemorate the sesquicentennial (150

years) of the American Civil War. Throughout 2012, these programs and activities have been put on across Virginia. One such project is a partnership between the Commission and the Library of Virginia called the CW 150 Legacy Project. It's purpose is to identify and locate original source materials throughout the state that are related to the Civil War, such as letters, diaries, memoirs, discharge papers and select memorabilia, in order to scan and digitize them for both preservation and public access.

Letter from the President

History is a cyclic poem written by Time upon the memories of man ~Percy Bysshe Shelley

To a person suddenly struck with amnesia, who remembers absolutely nothing, the world looks more or less the same as to a newborn child.

We are thankful for your memberships and donations during 2012. In January, we will begin our annual fundraising drive by sending notifications of membership dues. Before we ask you to join (or re-join) our society, here's an update on where we've been and where we're headed. We held several significant programs last year, including a Spring reception for the public "unveiling" of the Eleanor Roosevelt Dress, which remains on display at the 1908 Courthouse; and a wonderful Fall program on the history of the Grayson National Bank. We also resumed quarterly publication of our Newsletter, Glimpses of Grayson, which features a brand new format.

Meanwhile, work is underway at our new headquarters on Courthouse Street, which should look a lot better by late spring. We have much more room at our new location, including a designated area for genealogical research.

As for 2013, we again plan to hold several free programs, bringing in speakers to talk about a wide range of topics. We will continue our long-term project of assessing and cataloguing our collection of photographs and artifacts. Our long range goals include plans to improve our exhibits and their accessibility to the public.

So what do we need from you? First, we hope to see you at all of our programs. Look out for invitations via e-mail, phone calls, post cards or public advertisements. Second, we hope our annual members will re-enlist by filling out the form and paying the modest dues. For those of you who aren't members, we hope you will consider joining. Your membership dues will go a long way toward helping us offer educational programing in the local school systems, free programs for the public, the conservation and care of our collections, as well as covering annual operating expenses.

Finally, we would hope everyone (including life members, who, of course, owe nothing in annual dues) might consider a contribution to our general operating fund. You can combine your membership dues and any donation on one check and mail it in the stamped envelopes we will provide.

We fully understand that the economy is still struggling, and that this isn't the best time to ask for money. But we do hope that you view the Grayson County Historical Society – which collects, preserves, and disseminates local history, offers free programs, and supports other community endeavors – as worthy of your financial support.

On Tuesday October 23rd, GCHS and Grayson National Bank cohosted a presentation on the history of the bank and the important role it has played in the economic development of our community. Thirty three people attended the event. After an introduction by David Hauslohner, GCHS Treasurer, Allan Funk, Chief Lending Officer of GNB gave a brief talk about the bank's history as well as its future aspirations, using power point slides as a guide. Former Bank President Carl Richardson provided additional historical information. GNB also made available many ledger books, pictures and documents from throughout its history that were examined by attendees. GCHS displayed several old GNB newspaper ads from its archives, dating from as early as 1917, as well as biographical information for some of the

earliest bank presidents. Current GNB President Jacky Anderson was present to greet attendees and answer questions, and light refreshments were served. The informal event provided the opportunity for

community members to learn the history of this vital institution while engaging in conversation about common goals and challenges. The next event in this series will be held in conjunction with the Grayson County Virginia Cooperative Extension office.


